Project Return Members, City of Santa Monica File Discrimination Lawsuits

"The issue here is stigma," Ron Bara, Project Return Outreach Coordinator, says when asked about the \$6 million lawsuit he and 11 residents of the Manor have filed against the College Cafe in Santa Monica. "The attitude is that mentally ill persons are different and should be treated differently."

Bara and members of the Manorities, a Project Return club, were allegedly refused service at the College Cafe when they attempted to order pizzas at the restaurant on July 25. The outing to the College Cafe was a special dinner planned by the club members. "They had earned the money for dinner by selling popcorn to other residents at the Manor (a nearby community care facility where all the club members live.) It was supposed to be a fun night out, a reward for all of their hard work," said Bara.

The City of Santa Monica has also filed suit charging the restaurant with violations of the Business and Professional Code and the Unruh Civil Rights Acts. The City's \$37,500 suit accuses the co-owners of the College Cafe of singling out "a class of in-

dividuals for disparate treatment without any legal or factual basis." The suit also seeks an injunction against the cafe to prohibit it from discriminating against residents of the Manor.

In response to the lawsuits, Nader Ghiam, a co-owner of the College Cafe, was quoted in the Santa Monica Evening Outlook as saying, "I don't think there should be any suit because we didn't...discriminate. We only refused to serve people who looked dirty and smelled. We didn't refuse them because they come from a certain house or a certain community."

In response to Ghiam's statement, Bara shook his head in disbelief. "Everyone was dressed up in their best slacks and dresses. I ordered pizzas and was about to pay when Mr. Ghiam said he wouldn't serve the group. Finally, he agreed to take our order on a take-out basis."

"You try so hard to make something of yourself, to show people things are better," says Pat Proctor, one of the Manorite club members who was alledgedly refused service, "and then something like this happens."

The members were very hurt by the

incident," Bara says, "but others in the community have responded to reports of the incident in the Evening Outlook with support and concern."

Fred Deni, owner of the Back on Broadway Restaurant in Santa Monica, was outraged when he read about the alledged incident. As a result, Deni invited the group to be his luncheon guests. "It was quite lovely," Bara says of the luncheon at Back on Broadway. "Mr. Deni made us feel welcome and accepted."

At this time, no court dates for the impending lawsuits have been set.

AB2541 is on Governor's Desk

Landmark legislation to reform care for the mentally ill in California has gained final approval in the Legislature and has gone to the Governor who is expected to sign the measure.

The bill, AB2541 by Assemblyman Bruce Bronzan (D-Fresno) focuses on Community Support Programs for the homeless mentally ill. \$20 million will be available to counties to structure basic services such as food, shelter, and income for the homeless mentally ill.

In addition, the bill creates a subsidy for the rate paid to the board and care facilities which house the mentally ill. Other provisions include increased involvement of mental health officials in placement of disturbed children, delineation of law enforcement duties in psychiatric emergencies, state-funded research, and a "targeted supplement fund" to help counties address their most pressing needs.

The Governor has until October 2 to act on AB2541.

Project Return: A Network of Friends

"I used to feel so alone and sort of useless," Janice explains. "I was afraid to go out and do things. I didn't have any friends."

Two years ago, Janice joined a Project Return club and, as she will quickly tell you, last year she was elected as an officer of her club. "I never thought I'd be able to plan or lead an activity," Janice says, "but I can. I have friends now. I can share my ideas with others. People listen to me."

Project Return gave Janice a starting

point from which to rebuild her selfconfidence and work toward a more independent lifestyle. "Project Return is the first organization I ever belonged to," Janice says. "It helped me to realize I can do more with the support of others than I could ever do all by myself."

For people like Janice, joining a Project Return club can be a first step away from the isolated, inactive lives they have lead as a result of their

The members of Project Return Center want to show the City of Santa Monica that individuals disabled by persistent mental illness can be good neighbors. "We want everyone to be pleased we are here," says Susan Dempsay, the Center's Director. "We want to help make Santa Monica a better place for everyone who works or lives here "

Among the civic projects currently being undertaken by the Center's members and staff includes "Graffiti Exterminators" which is a service offered to local businesses and individuals.

Project Return Center members will paint over any graffiti on Santa Monica buildings if the buildings's owner will supply the paint. "Donations to the Center in thanks for our services won't be turned down." Dempsay says, "but we don't view

this as a money making project."

In general, Project Return Center and the City of Santa Monica have developed a harmonious relationship. During a recent City Council meeting, three council members publically congratulated the Center and its members for doing such a good job of "fitting into the city."

severe and persistent mental illness. Since Project Return began five years ago, more than 500 long-term mentally ill adults have formed a partnership with mental health professionals and community volunteers that has resulted in a growing, learning experience for everyone involved.

"It's a two way street," Joannie Baracz, Coastal Regional Coordinator for Project Return says. "Everyone is benefiting from Project Return. Community volunteers who work with club members in my region can't get over how terrific and caring all the members are."

Recently, Baracz suffered from a severe back injury that required hospitalization. "I was the most visited patient at Long Beach Memorial," Baracz says. "Members filled the waiting room and took turns coming in to cheer me up. I don't know how I would have gotten through this experience without their support."

"Project Return is the framework that allows people to help each other," John Siegel, the program's director, says. "It brings people together who otherwise wouldn't be interacting."

"People are helping each other to help themselves," says Debra Hamilton, Regional Coordinator for San Gabriel Valley. "Project Return is really working."

In the San Gabriel Valley, Project Return members have joined with family members from the Alliance for the Mentally III, mental health professionals and community volunteers to form a recreation coalition. "We have a great time," Hamilton says. "We all look forward to the next dance or barbeque."

More than 250 members and volunteers attended the Recreation Coalition's last barbeque." At our barbeques, everyone pitches in to help," says Hamilton, "There's something about preparing a meal together that strengthens our understanding and acceptance of each other."

Project Return clubs are based on a self-help model, but they are not exclusively self-help. The clubs are run by members who have been elected as club officers with the help of a trained facilitator who acts as the club's adviser. "The facilitators are the clubs' links to the community," Siegel says. "They help members develop socialization skills and to learn how to better use resources in the community."

The goal of Project Return is to help everyone reach their maximum potential and to discover new ways to use their talents and abilities. "Project Return Clubs have helped fill a void in my life. After my second marriage failed and I lost custody of my four daughters, I received very little emotional support from my family and friends," says Sandy Craddick, Project Return News Editor. "With the help of Project Return members and staff I have turned my life around and I am doing secretarial work part-time."

Project Return offers members room to grow. As club officers develop leadership skills, they often become co-facilitators of their clubs or officers in the Project Return Federation, a countywide group made up of representatives from each club.

Mark Karmatz, president of the Project Return Federation, sees Project Return's members' as community educators. "What Project Return does is show the community in general that we are just as human as everyone else is. Project Return is part of a movement that educates the public to the idea that someone who has been through the mental health system has rights just as anyone else does. One thing I find is that there is a beauty amongst people who have been through the system. We need to think of ourselves as the beautiful people we are. It is possible that through Project Return we can show that we are part of the norm."

Project Return operates in each of Los Angeles County's five regional districts. There are more than 50 clubs countywide. Because each club is a composite of its members, no two clubs are exactly alike.

"I am continually amazed by the creative approach club members think up to help each other," says Vergie Robinson, Coordinator for the Central and Southeast Regions. "One male member was about to become a father and the other club members used their own money to buy gifts for him. When one member is in need, the others come through for him. Project

Return has taught all of us to give and share with other."

In every region, Project Return members have shown a resourcefulness for raising their own activity funds. Each club thinks up its own money making strategies. "We have bake sales, burrito sales, car washes." Judy Cooperberg, the San Fernando Valley Regional Coordinator, says. "We're always thinking up new ways to earn money so we can be more active."

The money earned by each club is used for fieldtrips, movies, concerts, camping trips or dining out at local restaurants. "Most of the members are on fixed incomes," Cooperberg says. "They can't afford to do things that cost money. Earning their own funds for an activity gives members a sense of pride and accomplishment. It's part of what makes Project Return such a confidence builder."

Important Deadline

Mentally impaired persons whose Social Security benefits were reviewed and denied between March 1981 and October 1984 are entitled to have their cases re-opened and re-evaluated under new rules ordered by Congress in 1984.

The deadline for requesting a review of denied benefits is October 30, 1985. While the appeals are being re-evaluated, applicants are entitled to have their benefits restored. Anyone eligible for this review should contact the Social Security Administration at (213) 381-6361 as soon as possible.

Individuals who do not take advantage of this re-evaluation process will need to re-file for Social Security benefits as a new case.
