GOVERNOR DAVIS ANNOUNCES ALMOST \$55 MILLION DOLLARS FOR HOMELESS MENTALLY ILL

Los Angeles County's Bell Shelter Receives \$4 million; Example of Success Story

SACRAMENTO - Governor Davis today announced \$54.9 million in funding to 34 local programs to continue Integrated Services Programs for Homeless Mentally Ill, an integral part of the Governor's Homeless Prevention Initiative.

"The goal of this program is to reduce the number of people with mental illness who are homeless by doing whatever it takes to help get them off the street and into appropriate treatment, permanent housing, and into jobs," Governor Davis said. "The funding I approved in next year's budget will allow these programs to continue their successful track records."

The \$54.9 million provided in the 2002-03 fiscal year will support 26 programs which will have 12 months of funding available to them through June 2004. Eight counties will receive six months of funding through December 2003. The eight counties were originally funded in the 2000-01 fiscal year on a provisional basis contingent on performance and availability of funding.

In an agreement with the State Department of Mental Health and the California Mental Health Directors Associations, all 26 existing programs (24 counties and two cities) agreed to a 4.5 percent cut to create new programs for seven provisionally funded counties and one new county that were performing well.

"I commend the counties for their unselfishness," said Governor Davis. "These county public officials understand that a voluntary program that provides good services will reduce homelessness because the homeless respond non-threatening programs."

Data from homeless mentally ill programs show that people enrolled in the program experienced a 65.6 percent drop in the number of hospital days; an 81.5 percent drop in the number of days spent in jail; and a 79.1 percent drop in the number of days spent homeless.
